This event aims to offer comprehensive information on the lives of ordinary North Koreans inside North Korea, as well as the lives of those outside of North Korea when they defect to China or other third countries to North Korean watchers and human rights activists in the DC area. During the first part of the event, DC PSCORE interns will make a presentation on life inside the North Korea, based on their research paper. The presentations will cover the social, economic and political issues facing ordinary North Koreans living inside Kim Jong II's regime. The second part of the event will be more focused on the struggles that North Koreans face once they defect from North Korea. After a short introductory presentation on human rights inside North Korea, defectors will make speeches on North Koreans' life in China, a third country, and in South Korea respectively, followed by a Q&A.
